

OVERVIEW

Good Friday is a significant day in the Christian calendar that commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. According to Christian belief, it is the day on which Jesus was arrested, tried, and sentenced to death by crucifixion. The events leading up to his crucifixion include the Last Supper (the Passover meal Jesus shared with his disciples), his prayer and agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, and his betrayal by Judas Iscariot.

Following his arrest, Jesus underwent multiple trials before Jewish and Roman authorities, including the Jewish Sanhedrin and Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor of Judea at the time. Despite finding no fault in Jesus, Pilate yielded to the demands of the crowd and sentenced him to death by crucifixion. Jesus was then scourged and made to carry his cross to the site of his execution, Golgotha, also known as Calvary. He was crucified alongside two criminals. According to the Gospels, Jesus uttered several statements from the cross, including the famous "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34) and "It is finished" (John 19:30), before he died.

Good Friday is observed with solemnity and reflection by Christians around the world. Many churches hold services that focus on Jesus' suffering and sacrifice, and some communities participate in processions or enactments of the Stations of the Cross, which depict Jesus' journey to the crucifixion site. It is a day of fasting and penance for many Christians, leading up to the celebration of Easter, which commemorates Jesus' resurrection.


